WHERE SKILLS AND EDUCATION CONNECT WITH COMMUNITY AND REAL LIFE LEARNING

WHAT: A demonstration of skills to showcase Career and Technical Education programs in Washington state. Secondary and postsecondary students will come together for a one-day competition to demonstrate their technical skills. Each team of five will build a portable, energy efficient, homeless shelter.

Shelters will be donated to a WA community willing to address their homeless issue by accepting all 25.

WHERE: The Capital Campus, Olympia, WA (North Diagonal)

WHEN: March 27, 2017

WHO: This competition is open to the first 25 teams from Washington's public high schools, skill centers, community colleges and technical colleges. Teams must have the support of and be accompanied by their program instructor, and must demonstrate connection to and support from their local trades community.

Outreach and Promotion

The student leadership organizations (CTSOs) such as Skills USA, FBLA and DECA will work with their schools' team to raise awareness of the project and support for travel and expenses. The CTSDs will research community homelessness and be prepared to tell the story of how this issue affects their community. This information will be displayed within the team's building space during the event.

Teams will be expected to have someone available who is able to share career information with legislators or other interested observers about future education and job opportunities that are available for individuals working within the construction trades. This may be accomplished in partnership with the CTSDs.
