FUTURE OF WORK TASK FORCE PUBLISHES NEW REPORT

The state's Future of Work Task Force issued a report last week to the Governor and Legislature that includes key policy recommendations to help ensure shared prosperity among Washington's workers, employers, and communities. The report includes a focus on enhancing worker training so employees can be upskilled as technology accelerates. This first-in-the-nation effort to investigate the future of work was funded by the 2018 Legislature and put Washington in the spotlight as a thought leader. The Legislature funded two staff positions at the Workforce Board and created a 16-member Task Force made up of legislators, business, and labor leaders. The Task Force was charged with developing a set of policy recommendations to help Washington's businesses and workers prosper together. WORKFORCE BOARD STAFF TO TESTIFY ABOUT FUTURE OF WORK TO U.S. HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Speaking of the future of work, the U.S. House Higher Education and Workforce Investment subcommittee has asked Workforce Board staff to testify on December 18 about Washington's Future of Work project and Task Force. This includes a closer look at how the state's workforce system currently helps unemployed workers, an overview of the state's workforce training programs, and more details about the Task Force's policy recommendations to address upcoming challenges. Nova Gattman, the agency's Deputy Director for External Affairs, will provide the testimony before a national audience.

WORKFORCE BOARD ISSUES NEW BEHAVIORAL HEALTH REPORT

The Workforce Board has issued a new report that addresses shortages in behavioral health professions in Washington, in collaboration with the University of Washington Center for Health Workforce Studies. Behavioral health is an evolving area that incorporates mental health and substance use treatment. The report's recommendations were shaped by a workgroup that included health facility leaders, behavioral health providers, educators, organized labor, not-for-profit organizations, and state and local government agencies. A particular focus was on behavioral health licensing reciprocity, and the role of background checks in hiring and retention decisions, with an emphasis on criminal history or substance use disorder. PERKINS V PLAN PERFORMANCE TARGETS OPEN FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

The new federal Career and Technical Education (CTE) law, Perkins V, allows states to craft their own performance targets on a range of program success indicators and requires each state to release proposed targets for public comment. Proposed performance targets—both at the secondary (K-12) and postsecondary (community and technical college) levels—for the next three program years, beginning July 1, 2020, are available for review at https://www.wtb.wa.gov/about-us/carl-perkins-cte/. WORKFORCE BOARD TO DISCUSS STATE WORKFORCE PLAN PRIORITIES TOMORROW IN AUBURN

The Workforce Board meets at the Junior Achievement Pemco Achievement Zone in Auburn Wednesday (Nov. 20) from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and will be asked for input on priorities, goals, and guidance in updating the state's strategic workforce plan, "Talent and Prosperity for All" or TAP. The Board will also provide input on how to best engage stakeholders and the public in updating the portion of the state's plan that addresses Career and Technical Education, known as Perkins. NEW STUDENT COMPLAINT PORTAL OPENS

A new online portal has opened for students attending private career schools and other regulated institutions to file consumer protection complaints. The portal launched earlier this month and is the result of legislation passed in 2019 requiring several regulatory agencies to collaborate on a public-facing portal. The Workforce Board, Washington Student Achievement Council, and state Department of Licensing are the site's primary partners, along with the state's Nursing Commission. WASHINGTON EMPLOYERS HONORED FOR HIRING VETERANS

The state's Employment Security Department recognized 12 Washington businesses and public agencies earlier this month for their efforts to hire military veterans in 2019. Employment Security created the Hire-A-Vet award to call attention to unemployed veterans in Washington and to recognize companies with a good track record of hiring, retaining, and celebrating veterans in their workforce. STATE GRANTS AVAILABLE TO ADD BEHAVIORAL HEALTH FACILITIES

The state's Department of Commerce is accepting applications from community hospitals, healthcare providers and others for grants to expand or build new behavioral health facilities in the Spokane region. The legislature set aside \$2 million for one or more facilities to provide an additional 16 crisis or stabilization beds as part of a federal court settlement. The grant is referred to as the Trueblood Competitive Grant. These new beds will address both urban and rural needs. The Workforce Board staffs the state's Health Workforce Council and actively tracks capacity issues and education and training needs for our state's health workforce. Workforce Board staff are also evaluating behavioral health workforce needs as part of a focused assessment on this evolving healthcare field. It includes both mental health and substance-use disorders that impact health. FOUR WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT AREAS RECEIVE \$5.8M TO FIGHT POVERTY

Governor Inslee awarded \$5.8 million from the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Statewide Activities fund to fight poverty in four workforce development regions across the state as part of "Economic Security for All." It's intended to support a long-term, systemic approach to helping Washingtonians move out of poverty at large scale. The state will measure success on two key statistics: the number of families receiving food assistance benefits who move up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level, and net poverty reduction for their entire community by March 2022. Four Workforce Development Councils were awarded funding and include: Benton-Franklin WDC; Workforce Southwest Washington (Clark, Cowlitz, and Wahkiakum counties); Workforce Central (Pierce County); Spokane Workforce Council.

SELF SUFFICIENCY CALCULATOR REDESIGNED

There's now a fresher look and feel for the Self Sufficiency Calculator that helps Washington residents learn about the cost of living in their local area, how to budget for expenses from healthcare to housing, and what impact different career choices and training programs might have on their ability to earn a living wage, among other features. The calculator is maintained by the Workforce Development Council of Seattle-King County, in partnership with other Workforce Development Councils in the state, and is updated with new data every two to three years. STAY ON TOP OF WORKFORCE BILLS WITH LEGISLATIVE TRACKER

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WASHINGTON'S MINIMUM WAGE CLIMBS TO \$12 PER HOUR

The minimum wage in Washington has increased to \$12 per hour, starting January 1, for workers age 16 and older. Under state law, tips do not count toward a worker's minimum wage. Also, employers can pay workers under 16 years old 85 percent of the minimum wage. For 2019, that comes out to \$10.20. When Initiative 1433 passed in 2016, it set a schedule for Washington's minimum wage over a four-year period. In 2020, the state's minimum wage will rise to \$13.50. SURVEY PROVIDES WASHINGTON NURSING WORKFORCE SNAPSHOT

A new report from the Washington Center for Nursing surveyed over 9,200 nurses from across the state and looked at career satisfaction, salary, and hours worked, among other items.
